

Colin M. Bloor, MD died at the San Diego Hospice on September 9, 2010 from complications due to a stroke suffered in July. He was 77 years old.

Colin was born May 26, 1933 in Sandusky, Ohio. He received his M.D. degree and completed a pathology residency at Yale Medical School. He was a research fellow at Nuffield Institute for Medical Research at Oxford. After an additional research fellowship at Yale, he served in the U.S. Army, spending four years at the Walter Reed Army Institute before coming to UC San Diego in 1968. He remained on the faculty of UC San Diego until his retirement in 2002.

He was always very active at UCSD, including service as chair of the campus Committee on Academic Personnel, chair of the Privilege and Tenure Committee, Director of the Molecular Pathology Graduate Program, and Acting Chair of the Department of Pathology. Colin stayed involved with UC after retirement as well. He had just been appointed to chair the Council of University of California Emeriti Associations for the coming year.

Colin had been a member of the La Jolla Symphony & Chorus since 1987, performing in concerts around the world. He was active in the Congregational Church of La Jolla, and was also an avid tennis player and photographer.

Colin will be remembered by family, friends and colleagues as a soft-spoken, generous soul who brightened every day with his sense of humor, his stories for every occasion, and the ever-present silly quips.

Colin is survived by his wife of 50 years Maxine, son Colin (Kris), daughters Nadine Wilson (Ollie) and Lindsey; and grandson Nolan.
