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

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

Guest Conductor Maria Guinand



When the La Jolla Symphony & Chorus attended the International Choral Festival in British Columbia in July, 1992, we discovered Latin America's gift to the world of choral music: the Schola Cantorum de Caracas. With co-directors Maria Guinand and her husband Alberto Grau, the Schola gave electric performances of a repertoire that included every era of choral music. As we left Canada, we were determined to learn more from the Latin American musical perspective, and we dreamed of having Ms. Guinand work with us. This concert

is the realization of that dream.

Born in Caracas, Venezuela, Guest Conductor Maria Guinand is currently Professor of General Music Studies at the Universidad Simon Bolivar, of Choral Conducting at the "Conservatorio de la Orquesta Nacíonal Juvenil", Conductor of the "Cantoria Alberto Grau" of the "Orfeon Simon Bolivar", Associate Conductor of the "Schola Cantorum of Caracas" and Assistant Conductor of Symphonic-Choral Performances of the "Orquesta Sinfonica Simon Bolivar". She is Dean of the Academic Program of the Youth Orchestral Movement at the Conservatorio Nacíonal Simon Bolivar, and organizes the activities of several Associations such as Fundacíon Schola Cantorum de Caracas, Fundacíon Movimento Choral Contemos, Academia Bach de Venezuela and Academia Nacíonal de Canto Gregoriano.

On several occasions, she has taken her choirs to international festivals and competitions and has received glowing reviews from critics. With the "Cantoria Alberto Grau" she obtained six prizes in 1989: four First Places and two Third Places in III Neuchatel International Festival (Switzerland) and in the XXXVII Polypnonic "Guido D'Arezzo" Competition. She also participated as conductor-observer in several international choral events where she has given workshops and seminars on Latin American and Venezuelan choral music.

Maria Guinand obtained her Bachelor's Degree in Music in 1976 and her Master's Degree in Music in 1982, both from the University of Bristol, England. In 1980 she was named Director of the Choirs of the "Conservatorio de la Orquesta Nacíonal Juvenil" (National Youth Orchestra Conservatory). Ms. Guinand has studied "Interpreting Gregorian Chant" with Luigi Agustoni and Johannes Berchmans Goeschl. She has also studied Choral and Orchestral Conducting under the eminent Helmuth Rilling.

The La Jolla Symphony & Chorus is honored to have this opportunity to sing for this distinguished conductor and we are delighted to share the experience with our San Diego County audience.

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
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
