Meet the Soloists

Kerrie Caldwell, coloratura soprano, has been "outstanding" voice praised her professional (LGBT "commanding presence" Weekly). On the operatic stage, Ms. Caldwell has performed Mrs. Fiorentino in Street Scene, both Lauretta and Nella in Gianni Schicchi, The Fox in The Cunning Little Vixen, Amahl in Amahl and the Night Visitors and Romilda in Handel's Serse. As a featured concert soloist, she has performed Britten's Spring Symphony, Faure's Requiem, Rutter's Requiem, St. Matthew Passion, Vaughan Williams' Sinfonia Antartica, Elijah, and Selva Morale e Spirituale of Monteverdi. Ms. Caldwell is currently pursuing a Master of Music degree at the College-Conservatory of Music (CCM) in Cincinnati, OH.

Leslie Leythem, mezzo-soprano, is pursuing a Doctorate of Musical at UC San Diego, where she commissions, performs and designs contemporary operatic works. She received her M.M. from the Boston Conservatory and was a founding member of Guerilla Opera Company in Boston, where she premiered leading roles in We are Sons, by Rudolf Rojahn, and in Andy Vores's operatic setting of Sartre's No Exit. Her opera roles include Zita in Puccini's Gianni Schicchi, Prince Orlofsky in Johann Strauss's Die Fledermaus, and Elizabeth Proctor in Robert Ward's The Crucible, Puck in A Midsummer Night's Dream and Bianca in The Rape of Lucretia.

At the young of age 23, tenor **Christian Sanders** is already drawing national attention for a voice of "power, accuracy, and tenderness," and a "riveting" stage presence well beyond his years."

Mr. Sander's operatic repertoire encompasses the roles of Tom Rakewell in Stravinsky's *The Rake's Progress*, Tamino in Mozart's *Die Zauberflöte*, Rinuccio in Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi*, and Prince Charmant in Massanet's *Cendrillon*. He has also appeared as Welko in Strauss' *Arabella* with The Santa Fe Opera. Mr. Sanders holds a Bachelors of Arts Magna Cum Laude in Music with a minor in Cell and Molecular Biology from Point Loma Nazarene University.

Anthony Whitson-Martini is already distinguishing himself as a "young and talented baritone" who is "easy on the eyes and the ears" (San Diego Theater Reviews). Mr. Whitson-Martini has performed as Baron Zeta (Die Lustige Witwe), Nardo (La finta giardiniera), Papageno (Die Zauberflöte scenes) with Point Loma Opera Theater; Patrick (Mame) with San Diego Lyric Opera; and as a chorister with San Diego Opera (Moby Dick). He has received multiple prestigious awards: Mondavi Vocal Competition (National Semi-Finalist), Carmel Music Society (2nd Place), and the LJS&C Young Artist Competition (Most Promising). Anthony is finishing his B.A. in Music at Point Loma Nazarene University.

<u> Messiah-Sing Tradition</u>

Since December 1978 La Jolla Symphony and Chorus has given Messiah-Sing to the community as a celebration of the Christmas season. Messiah-Sing holds the distinction of being the first Messiah "sing-along" in San Diego County with its earliest performances at St. James-by-the-Sea Episcopal Church, La Jolla. The first performance was accompanied by Jared Jacobsen, then organist and choir-master at St. James; later performances were enhanced by the addition of the La Jolla Symphony Messiah-Sing Chamber Orchestra. Messiah-Sing became so popular that it finally "outgrew" St. James. At the invitation of Pastor David Jorstad (LJSC tenor), the community sing moved to Clairemont Lutheran Church in 1993, and remained there until it "outgrew" that sanctuary as well. December 2012 marks the seventeenth Messiah-Sing at St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic Church, Carlsbad.
