Meet the Soloists

Hailed by Opera News as "vibrant," soprano Katherine Polit is quickly gaining recognition on the concert and operatic stage. Her most recent performances include Mozart's Exsultate Jubilate with the Helena Symphony, Vivaldi's Gloria at Lincoln Center and Samuel Barber's Knoxville, Summer of 1915 with the Owensboro Symphony. In January she will sing Pamina in The Magic Flute with Pacific Symphony. Katherine has also been featured with Virginia Opera, Opera Naples, Opera Louisiane, and the Ohio Light Opera. She completed her post-graduate studies at Indiana University and holds a Master of Music from The University of Texas at Austin and a Bachelor of Humanities and Arts from Carnegie Mellon University.

Mezzo-Soprano Sarah-Nicole Carter has been hailed by the L.A. Times as "simply wonderful", and as having "verve and vibrant color" by San Diego Story. Recent performances have included a Kennedy Center debut performing La Lettre du Jardinière by Marcel-Lucien Tournier, Berta in The Barber of Seville and Jack's Mom in Into The Woods at Utah Festival Opera and Musical Theater and Kate in The Pirates of Penzance at San Diego Opera. As a soloist she has performed with Opera Saratoga, Utah Festival Opera & Musical Theater, the Los Angeles Conducting Institute, Eureka Symphony, Grossmont Symphony, San Diego Master Chorale, Colorado Choral Arts Society, and Loveland Opera. She is a core member of the San Diego Opera chorus and a staff singer at All Souls Episcopal Church in Point Loma, CA.

Timothy Simpson is an active performer in a number of San Diego's prestigious ensembles. He has a been a featured soloist in *All is Calm* with San Diego Opera and Bodhi Tree Concerts, Handel's *Messiah*, Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, Bach's *Magnifcat in D* and Cantata 63 at First United Methodist Church of San Diego, and Handel's *L'Allegro, Il Penseroso, ed il Moderato* with Grossmont Symphony and Master Chorale. In concert with San Diego Symphony, Timothy was featured in "Beyond the Score: Ive's Symphony No. 2: Things Our Father Loved", and also in the Symphony's Summer Pops Final Fantasy and Broadway Pops concerts.

Baritone Michael Sokol has distinguished himself in opera and oratorio throughout the US and Europe, with companies including the Metropolitan Opera, Santa Fe Opera, Boston Opera, the Netherlands Opera Zuid, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Milwaukee Symphony, the Slovenian Philharmonic, the Phoenix Symphony and the Cincinnati Symphony under the baton of James Levine, Maurice Abravanel, Charles Dutoit, Lukas Foss, Skitch Henderson and Scott Dunn among others. He is the founder and director of the San Diego Summer Gilbert and Sullivan Workshop.

Messiah-Sing Tradition

Since December 1978 La Jolla Symphony and Chorus has given Messiah-Sing to the community as a celebration of the Christmas season. Messiah-Sing holds the distinction of being the first Messiah "sing-along" in San Diego County with its earliest performances at St. James-by-the-Sea Episcopal Church, La Jolla. The first performance was accompanied by Jared Jacobsen, then organist and choirmaster at St. James; later performances were enhanced by the addition of the La Jolla Symphony Messiah-Sing Chamber Orchestra. Messiah-Sing became so popular that it finally "outgrew" St. James. At the invitation of Pastor David Jorstad, the community sing moved to Clairemont Lutheran Church in 1993, and remained there until it "outgrew" that sanctuary as well. December 2017 marks the twenty-second Messiah-Sing at St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic Church, Carlsbad.

Guest Conductor's Program Note

What keeps us returning to *Messiah* year after year? Indeed, this is a work that has an unbroken performance history dating back to Handel's lifetime. That *Messiah* became an institution is without question a testament to Handel's unparalleled storytelling prowess. Much of the appeal of *Messiah* is displayed in Handel's bold and subtle use of text painting in creating an impression of a plot or narrative, where one is not present. In this fashion, Handel's *Messiah* becomes more than the sum of its parts; yet, each moment captivating on its own.

In our own experience this afternoon, our *Messiah* 'Sing' serves as catalyst for fostering community and bridging gaps, and for a brief moment we are drawn together once more by Handel's musical genius. A community 'Sing' of any kind, be it *Messiah*, a rousing church hymn, or the ubiquitous *Take me out to the ball game* during the seventh inning stretch, is at its best also more than the sum of its parts, each of us bringing our experiences and talents woven into one rich community tapestry.

After meeting Laurie San Martin, one this country's most important ebullient composers, we'll experience the lightness of a classical great—the seldom-heard 8th Symphony of Beethoven—and conclude with Leonard Bernstein's extraordinary and poignant Symphony No. 3 (Kaddish), with chorus, soprano soloist and narrator. The Bernstein piece, named for the Jewish prayer for the dead, was dedicated to the late President John F. Kennedy and premiered in the days after of his assassination in 1963. It is a reflection simultaneously on the loss of a president and the loss of a generation of European Jews. It is powerful music, but also hopeful.
