Come join Eric Bromberger for the continued exploration behind the scenes of our very own San Diego Symphony. The series continues with four more classes giving participants the opportunity to meet the guest artists, conductors, musicians, and the people behind-the-scenes who help make these concerts happen.

It is not necessary to attend the Symphony concerts to enjoy these lectures. If you are just interested in learning more about classical music and discovering new ways to listen and understand how it is created, this class is for you. Each two-hour session will preview a specific upcoming concert and the music to be performed and give a peek "behind-thecurtain" of what is involved in putting on each performance. The first hour will introduce the music to be performed, discuss its background, and offer ways to approach it. The second hour will bring in guest soloists, conductors, and some of the musicians and staff from the Symphony management, who will answer questions from the class.

Tuesday, February 19 - President Douglas Gerhardt joins conductor and celebrated guitar soloist Angel Romero for the first class. Eric Bromberger will cover the concerts on February 22 & 23 featuring Ravel's La Valse, Rodrigo's Concierto de Aranjuez and the Symphonic Dances of Rachmaninoff.

Thursday, March 7 - Personnel Manager Doug Hall will shed some insights into the complexities of coordinating the schedules and responsibilities for over one - hundred musicians. Eric will explore the music featured on March 8 & 9: Arvo Pärt's *Cantus*, Meyer Violin Concerto and Mozart's Symphony No. 41, the "Jupiter."

Tuesday, April 9 - Pianist, Mary Barranger joins Eric as he illuminates the April 12-14 programs featuring Offenbach's Overture to *Orpheus in the Underworld*, Faure's *Ballade*, Ravel's Piano Concerto in G Major, Debussy's *La Mer* and Ravel's *Bolero*.

Tuesday, April 30 - Principal flute Sarah Tuck joins Eric for the final class of the series and their unique insights into the final program on May 3, 4 & 5 featuring Debussy's Prelude to the Afternoon of a Faun and Stravinsky's Rite of Spring.

Eric Bromberger, who has lectured at the Athenaeum, is program annotator for the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, Fleet-Boston Celebrity Series, San Francisco Performances, La Jolla Chamber Music Society, Stotsenberg Recital Series at Pepperdine University, San Diego's Mainly Mozart Festival, and others. He is often asked by performers to provide program notes: last season David Finckel, cellist of the Emerson Quartet, asked him to write the notes for Finckel's recital at Wigmore Hall in London, and the Alexander Quartet used his notes for their performance of the complete cycle of Beethoven quartets in New York City. He recently became one of the program annotators of the Minnesota Orchestra.
