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## THE METROPOLITAN BRASS QUINTET



The Metropolitan Brass Quintet, founded in 1985, has, over the years, evolved into one of the most outstanding and unique brass ensembles in the country. It is responsible for the transcription and performance of a great number of well-known (and less well-known) works from the baroque, classical and romantic eras as well as many works from the twentieth century. Additionally, a number of compositions have been composed specifically for the Metropolitan Brass Quintet to showcase the ensemble and its individual soloists.

During its fourteen-week touring season, the ensemble performs on concert and artist series, at colleges, universities, chamber music societies and art councils all over the United States. In the summer months, the Quintet is in residence in New England. Based in Tilton, New Hampshire; Ridge, New Hampshire; and Woodstock, Vermont; the group presents dozens of concerts and recitals all over New England and New York State.

Known by many concert-goers and school students from one end of America to the other as the "hardest" working chamber ensemble in America," the Metropolitan Brass Quintet is extremely active in and dedicated to the music education field. When on tour during the school year, they maintain a rigorous performing schedule, often presenting as many as four or five cultural enrichment programs a day on the days off from their evening concerts.

The Metropolitan Brass Quintet is in residence at the University of Connecticut at Avery Point, Chico State University, the Hampshire Country School and Tilton Academy.

Welcome to this year's Holiday Concert!

We are trying something different this season: building these concerts around our special guest artists—the Metropolitan Brass Quintet of Cleveland—who will perform with the orchestra and chorus and by themselves. This program features a range of bright and festive music appropriate to the season. The orchestra offers selections from Bizet's incidental music to **L'Arlesienne** (the opening movement is based on the old French Christmas song **Marcho dei Rei**) and the colorful **Huapango** of Mexican composer Jose Pablo Moncayo. The chorus presents two quite different settings of the **Gloria** text (one by Vivaldi, the other by contemporary English composer John Rutter) and two traditional favorites. The Metropolitan Brass Quintet performs a variety of pieces for brass (some to be announced from the stage) and joins the orchestra for the final movement of the **Concerto for Brass Quintet and String Orchestra** by Czech-American composer Karel Husa, composed in 1965.

There should be music here to please every taste, and we are delighted to have you with us for a truly festive start to the holiday season.



#### **ELIGIBILITY**

Instrumentalists: Junior Division age 18 and under

Senior Division age 28 and under

Contestants 18 years or younger may compete in either division, but not both.

**Vocalists:** Vocal contestants age 30 and under Contestants must be a resident of San Diego County or Baja California or must be studying with a music teacher in San Diego County or Baja California.

Contestants must provide his/her own accompanist and a copy of each selection for the judges. No photocopies will be accepted.

Former first-place winners are not eligible to compete in their former category.

#### REPERTOIRE

#### **Junior Instrumental Division:**

One memorized movement of a concerto or extended work with orchestra.

#### **Senior Instrumental Division:**

One complete memorized concerto or extended work with orchestra.

#### **Vocal Division:**

Three memorized solo works or arias with orchestral accompaniment. One of these works must be from the Baroque era and one must have English as its original language.

Because of the number of entries in the junior division, a final audition may be necessary. Please leave Saturday evening open in the event that a runoff is necessary. Please inform your accompanists about this possibility.

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
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
