Ernst Krenek, Austro-American dean of contemporary composers is represented on this concert by his Second Violin Concerto written in 1954 after his permanent move to the Los Angeles area. This U.S. Premiere of an important mid century work enhances the Symphony's already strong reputation for significant programming.

Janos Negyesy, former concertmaster of the Berlin Radio Orchestra brings to the Krenek concerto an astonishing wealth of experience in worldwide performances of contemporary music.

Catulli Carmina was composed seven years after the famous Carmina Burana. The color, drama and pulsating rhythms associated with Burana find an even tenser, more classical expression in these settings of the love poems of 1st century Roman, Catullus. The dramatic conflict of the work defines itself between the poles of Youth and Age, Eros and Sexus. Scored for Soprano and Tenor Solos, Chorus, 4 Pianos and 12 Percussionists, Catulli Carmina embodies all the primitive brilliance of Orff's late works.



This season celebrates Thomas Nee's fifteenth year as music director and principal conductor of the La Jolla Symphony. To our regular audience the growth of the symphony and the professionalism of the performances speak forcefully for the quality of his talents. Busy in a wide variety of conducting assignments as UCSD professor, last year he also directed UCSD's nationally recognized new music ensemble, SONOR, conducted ensembles at the Cabrillo Festival and the Cal Arts Contemporary Music Festival and continued as music director of New Hampshire Music Festival. A semiannual journal of writings of musicians on sundry subjects, called LATITUDES, which he edits and publishes reveals yet another delightful side of Thomas Nee's much loved and highly respected leadership.
