

I am very pleased to welcome you to the 2007-2008 Season of the La Jolla Symphony and Chorus. As you look through the concerts and repertoire, I am sure you will see some music that you know and love, and some music that you don't yet know and, I hope, will come to love.

The guiding philosophy in this programming has been to create a linkage between the great music of the past and

enticing new directions. I love the idea that our season begins with the American premiere of Philip Glass' *Cello Concerto*, welcoming back our good friend cellist Wendy Sutter. Also on that program is Beethoven's *Fourth Symphony*, which starts an important thread through our season of concise and elegant works from the 18th and early 19th centuries.

Of course, no season would be complete without a selection of undisputed masterpieces. We look forward to Berlioz's hallucinatory *Symphonie Fantastique*, Dvorak's *Seventh Symphony*, monumental choral works, and the ultimate link between past and present, Richard Strauss' tale of the transfiguration of the soul.

We are fortunate to have with us as guests this year four outstanding contemporary composers, beginning with Academy-award nominee Philip Glass in November. During the season, we will also welcome composers Ingram Marshall, Chinary Ung, and John Luther Adams to concerts of their works.

Performing the right music with the right people is about as good as it gets.



In 1827 a young French music student turned his own "lovesick despair" into one of the most revolutionary—and exciting—pieces of music ever written, the *Symphonie Fantastique*. Also on this program: Ingram Marshall's *Kingdom Come*—for electronic tape and orchestra—and Prokofiev's lyric *First Violin Concerto*, performed by Young Artists Competition winner Pasha Tseitlin.

JOINING US...Ingram Marshall

Marshall scored *Kingdom Come* for full orchestra with digital audiotape. The orchestral parts merge or blend with the taped music, "often either cascading downward or ascending...sometimes both," says Marshall. Written in memory of his brother-in-law, a journalist killed in Bosnia, this stunning piece includes Marshall's recordings of a Croatian hymn, a liturgy from a Serbian church, and a song fragment sung by a Bosnian Muslim.

A native of Cambodia now living in San Diego, Ung's roots are woven into the fabric of his identity and music. *Inner Voices* has been described as "a spectacular balancing act, mingling an advanced Western-modernist vocabulary with bits of plush Asian melody." (*NY Times*) This melodic, lively and provocative work won the prestigious Grawemeyer Award.

From his home in Alaska, Adams has created a unique musical world grounded in wilderness landscapes, indigenous cultures and natural phenomena. Adams describes *Dark Waves* as evoking a vast rolling sea: "waves of perfect fifths rise and fall... at the central moment these waves crest together in a tsunami of sound."




Pre-Concert Lectures
