

FACE THE MUSIC:

EXPERIENCES FOR THE EARS AND THE EYES



Telcome to our 2010-2011 season. In these performances you can expect not just sounds but fascinating sights. Following are a few highlights from each concert.

The season begins with Alexandre Scriabin's ecstatic **Prometheus**, featuring pianist **Noriko Kawai**, chorus, orchestra, and a special instrument called a "color organ." Expect a concerto grosso of light, color, image, and shadow inspired by the light-show artists of the 1960s psychedelic rock scene.

One of the great spectacles of the early 19th century was **Beethoven's** massive and eloquent **Missa Solemnis**. Requiring four powerful soloists, full chorus and orchestra, few pieces in the history of music can rival Beethoven's grand vision, which we offer you in December.

After the New Year, the feast for ears and eyes continues. An unusual combination of the coloristic richness of Debussy and the precise designs of composer/architect **Iannis Xenakis** starts us off in February in a concert that also features the contemporary ensemble **Real Quiet**. In March we bring you a concert of concertos. Young Artist Competition winner Hannah Cho performs Prokofiev's *Violin Concerto No. 2*, and you will be treated to a first anywhere—**Concerto for Florist and Orchestra**.

Then celebrate the passion season with **Bach**'s monumental **The Passion According to St. Matthew**, and in June relive the innovations of **Haydn**, one of the great musical progressives in history.

We invite you to keep both ears *and* eyes open with us in the 2010-2011 season!

Inspired by the interactive light-show artists of the late '60s rock scene, acclaimed video artist Ross Karre reshapes Scriabin's original color organ part into a concerto grosso of light, color, image and shadow. Our multi-media presentation will be framed by two works full of color on their own, Bernstein's sassy *Candide Overture* and Mahler's mighty *First Symphony*.

One of the great spectacles of the early 19th century, the Missa Solemnis was written for the installation of Beethoven's pupil and friend Archduke Rudolph as an archbishop. From out of his deafness, Beethoven fashioned a masterpiece of solemn strength and heartfelt expressiveness, requiring four powerful soloists, a huge chorus, and a full orchestra.
