elcome to our 2011-2012 season, *Stravinsky Circus!* As you might expect you will hear the music of Stravinsky, in all its color and variety. There are the great ballets *The Rite of Spring* and *The Firebird*, a choreographed version of *Les Noces* for pianos, percussion and chorus, and the jazz-inspired *Ebony Concerto*. Along with that there will be plenty of other music both older and more recent.

You'll hear the music of Beethoven and Brahms in performances of the first symphonies of each. We will play *Grind to a Halt* by Pulitzer Prize-winner David Lang, a member of our Artistic Advisory Board, and premieres by two local composers. Celebrate spring in a delightful program that reflects the many faces of the season with Benjamin Britten's *Spring Symphony*, a setting of fourteen poems for chorus and orchestra, Schumann's well-known *First Symphony*, and a jewel of a piece by Grieg.

Mixed in will be music of Ravel and Debussy along with a rare sighting of György Ligeti's **Poème Symphonique**, scored for 100 metronomes!

Suffice it to say that we will continue our tradition of mixing the masterpieces for orchestra and chorus with a colorful and exciting batch of new and unusual music. And we will do it all with the kind of energetic and exuberant performances you've come to expect from the La Jolla Symphony and Chorus.


