Originally from upstate New York, Vicki received her master's degree in vocal and piano performance from UCSD in 1977, and apart from a brief stint as an office worker, has always been a professional musician. Her other interests include gardening, traveling, collecting antiques, and reading, especially mysteries.

With degrees from Amherst and the University of Hartford, CT, Stewart has been professionally involved in community action health care issues. Cooking is one of his hobbies, and he has been owner and chef of his own restaurant. An avid science fiction, rugby, football, and tennis enthusiast, he also finds time to be bass soloist with the La Jolla Congregational Church

CONCERT PREVIEW: SOLLBERGER LEADS "MUSIC OF THE AMERICAS"

The La Jolla Symphony and Chorus are delighted to welcome guest conductor Harvey Sollberger for the final subscription concerts of the season on the weekend of May 14-15. A noted composer and one of the finest flutists in the country, Sollberger joined the faculty of the Music Department at UCSD in 1992. These concerts mark his debut with the orchestra.

For the concerts, Mr. Sollberger has assembled an intriguing program on the theme "Music of the Americas." The featured work will be Dvorak's Symphony No. 9 "From the New World", and before that the program will offer a varied selection of music from North America. It opens with the colorful Caminos, written in 1934 by Mexican composer Silvestre Revueltas. Caminos is a brilliant showpiece for a huge orchestra that prominently features winds and percussion in music based on Mexican folktunes and rhythms.

Next, the Chorus joins the orchestra for two works: *General Booth Enters Into Heaven* by Charles Ives, a dramatic and colorful homage to the founder of the Salvation Army, and Mr. Sollberger's own *Passages*, which receives its West Coast premiere at these concerts. *Passages*, which sets the works of three American poets, will feature

three San Diego soloists: soprano Patricia Minton Smith, bass Philip Larson, and flutist John Fonville.

Born in Iowa, Harvey Sollberger was educated at the University of Iowa and Columbia University. He

taught at Columbia, the Manhattan School of Music, and Indiana University before coming to UCSD. In 1962, he and composer Charles Wuorinen founded the Group for Contemporary Music, which has become one of the most important newmusic ensembles in the country.

A virtuoso flutist, Sollberger has made many recordings as both flutist and conductor, and he has received numerous awards, including the Joseph Bearns Prize, two Guggenheim Fellowships, and commissions from the Fromm Foundation, Koussevitsky Foundation, and the American Academy of Arts and Letters. At UCSD, he leads SONOR

and teaches compositon.

Both concerts will be introduced by a free lecture by Eric Bromberger in the Recital Hall one hour prior to concert time.
